TOWN MEETING WARRANT Tuesday, June 15, 2021

GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the voters of the Town of South Thomaston in the County of Knox and State of Maine, qualified to vote by law in Town affairs, to meet at the Snow Removal Equipment Building, 5 Airport Road, Owls Head, Maine, on Tuesday, the 15th day of June 2021 AD., at seven o'clock in the evening, then and there, to act upon the following articles to wit:

Article 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Dave Martucci was elected as moderator with three votes.

Article 2. To elect by written ballot one Selectboard member, one Assessor and one Overseer-of-the-Poor for a term until Town Meeting 2024.

Jeff Northgraves was elected with 83 votes.

There was a proposed amendment to the Article. At the end of the article add, "not withstanding the Futures Committee's recommendation, this article shall not be construed as preventing the Facility Committee from reevaluating possible renovation of the existing building if the Committee finds renovation advisable due to changing circumstances."

The moderator ruled this was not a substantive change.

Article 11. To see if the Town will approve the recommendation of the Gifford Butler Futures Committee that as soon as practical, and on a temporary basis, the Town library relocate to the existing Gilford Butler School building and that a classroom(s) be utilized for community space for a period up to five years.

Article 12. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to fund the preparation for temporary occupancy of the former Gilford Butler School Building by the South Thomaston Library.

Jeff Northgraves moved \$20,000 from surplus be used to fund preparation of the temporary move of the library into Gilford Butler School.

It was seconded and a discussion on funding and the use of surplus followed.

Article 35. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectboard to enter into an interlocal agreement with the charter municipalities of Camden and Rockport, and other municipalities as may also execute the interlocal agreement in the future, to jointly incorporate and administer a regional nonprofit corporate municipal utility district, known as the Midcoast Internet Development Corporation, which is authorized to make provisions for Broadband services?

Article 36. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectboard to expend \$5,000 in Federal American Rescue Plan funds to jointly conduct, with the charter municipalities of Camden and Rockport, and other municipalities as may also participate, a feasibility study of the Midcoast Internet Development Corporation?

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectboard on behalf of the Town to accept gifts and certain funds that may be left to the Town.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectboard to accept or dispose of all equipment.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectboard to transfer funds from unexpended balances and surplus as it deems necessary.

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectboard to make application for and execute any documents on behalf of the Town related to federal, state, grant and or other funds and to accept said funds if awarded and to authorize their expenditure.

Article 32. To see if the town will vote to charge interest on all delinquent taxes at the rate of 6 % per annum, computed on a daily basis and to establish two due dates for property taxes, with

one-half of the tax amount due October 1, 2021, and one-half of the tax amount due April 1, 2022.

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to give a 1.5% discount on any portion of property taxes, not yet committed, paid on or before July 1st of the current year.

Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to set the interest rate to be paid by the Town on abated taxes at a rate of 4% and to authorize such interest paid or abatements granted to be appropriated from the overlay funds, or if necessary, from unassigned fund balance.

Article passed as written.
